When Sometimes the calendar can create some unhappy coincidences. This year Valentine's Day is the same day as Ash Wednesday!

Valentine's Day is named after St Valentinus, who was martyred by the Romans for, among other things, secretly conducting Christian marriages. It's a day to celebrate romance, and especially married relationships.

Ash Wednesday, on the other hand, is a season of sadness as we remember all the sin in the world, and especially in our own hearts and lives, which led to Jesus' death on the cross.

It's also a time of new hopes and dreams; perhaps expressed in the tentative longing of a Valentine's card, but more generally shown to us by the snowdrops and crocus, the green shoots of daffodils and tulips, and the increased amount of daylight. My Auntie Mollie, now 96, can remember her aunt often reminding her that you could "eat your tea by daylight on Valentine's Day".



Christmas reminded us again that we are creatures of light. Light gives us hope, lifts depression, and guides our path. We see light as a positive image, even a refreshing one. Jesus is the light of the world, who beings the light of life. His word lights our path, and is like a hammer that breaks into pieces the rocky transience of human fashions and vain imaginings. Jesus' light shines in the darkness and the darkness cannot overcome it.

Spring, however, may be on its way but it has not yet arrived. February is usually cold, frosty, and hardly any warmer than January. If you were and alien who arrived in Redditch in December you could be forgiven that we lived in a climate that was always like this, cold, dark, sometimes damp, sometimes frosty, sometimes even some snow. That would not be the whole story, however.

Many thanks to everyone for their patience as first a gas leak cut off our heating, and the church boiler then played up during the coldest week of the year. Thanks too to the plumbers who repeatedly came up to Tardebigge and got the boiler fixed in the nick of time for the school's first Christmas performance. Having dealt with that, we then had the heavy snowfall which resulted in all services being cancelled on December 10th, but did put a rather interesting stripe down just one side of our spire!

One of the services cancelled on December 10th was our Gift Service, where the congregation donate presents for families less fortunate than ourselves. Despite the cancellation, we were amazed that parishioners continued to bring gifts in the following weeks, and we were able to take around 7 big black bags of presents to a very grateful Salvation Army, for them to distribute to the families in time for Christmas.



We were also very happy that so many people could join us for the Christmas services, notably the Carols by Candlelight and the packed house at Christingle! It is heartwarming to see that the Church still has a place at Christmas for most people, especially when you consider that less than a quarter of Chris's Christmas cards had any kind of religious motif on them (and he includes any pictures of villages with a church in them,

and a charming Guide Dogs for the Blind card offering 'gold, frankincense and fur'...!). The other point you may have noticed at St. Bartholomew's is a diminishing number of choir members (compare only 7% of Chris's Christmas cards which had a choir in the picture, but at least they still feature!). Here we must express our gratitude to the four 'extras' from as far away as Clent who robed up and tested their musical skills to help put on a really good carol service for us! Celestial Corner


First of all, although it is a bit late, may I wish all you readers a happy and, more importantly, a healthy 2018.

February and looking South, the sky is the best it will be for the whole year, with Orion and his bright companions dominating the scene! There is only one planet visible at the moment, but you will have to look out before around seven in the morning to see it. Jupiter is a morning object and rises before the sun. Jupiter takes twelve years to go around the sun, spending a year in each of the Zodiac signs. Last year Jupiter was in the constellation of Virgo. This year, due to it journey around the sun, it is in the next sign, Libra. If you remember, the constellations rise two hours earlier each month, so they seem to travel from East to West through the year, so if something rises at 2am this month, it will do so at midnight next month and 10 pm in April and will then be an "evening" object. Jupiter will rise at 8pm at roughly the end of April!

Orion, with two first magnitude stars, is one of the 'sign posts' of the sky, so called because it is useful as a pointer to other constellations. He is a hunter in Greek mythology. Imagine him facing you with his right leg straight and his left bent at the knee, as if his left foot is on a stool. His right shoulder is marked by 1st mag star Betelgeuse which has a slight orangey/red colour. It is a red giant and so large that if put in place of our sun it would swallow up all planets up to, and including, Mars! Orion's left ankle is marked by the other first mag star, the bluey/white Rigel; a younger and hotter star than Betelgeuse.

When the Greeks named the stars they classified Betelgeuse as Alpha, the brighter of the two, and Rigel as Beta. Either their eyes deceived them or Betelgeuse has faded slightly, which is the likely reason for Rigel today being the brighter of the two. Between the two lie the three stars that form Orion's belt and hanging beneath it are two fairly bright stars between which is a fuzzy patch. This patch is a stellar birthplace, where new stars are forming from the gas that makes up the parent nebula, M42. M43 is close by and considered to be an offshoot of M42, but you need a telescope to split the two! The other lesser stars mark Orion's right knee and left shoulder, with a triangle of faint stars marking his head and a line of faint stars forming his shield on his left arm.

We looked at Sirius in the last magazine. Its astronomical name is alpha Canis Majoris, the chief star of Canis Major, the big dog. One of two hunting dogs of Orion, it lies below and to the right of the star marking his right knee. The only other interesting object here is M41, an open cluster, (as opposed to a globular where the stars are packed close into a ball shape). It is classified as naked eye, but you would need to be well away from artificial lights to pick it out. A pair of 10x50 binoculars makes the job easier! Centre on Sirius then move slowly down until Sirius disappears, M41 should be just in the field of view at the bottom.






Bentley Pauncefoot WI

In many ways our members celebrated Christmas in a jolly and convivial manner. All who attended the Christmas party at the Potting Shed had a splendid, memorable evening in good company. An excellent meal was followed by silly fun as we tried to outdo each other in telling awful cracker jokes...... we knew a really impressive number of cracker jokes! A large party went to the Artrix in January to see the Oddsocks Theatre Company's rendering of "the Wizard of Oz". It was the Wizard of Oz as you've never seen him before – eat your heart out Donald Trump! The performance was creative, clever, anarchic and above all very, very funny. Just the tonic we needed for a cold winter's night.

However, we did not lose sight of the fact that not everyone was having such a carefree Christmas. Some Bentley members decided to do a "reverse Advent Calendar", On each day of Advent, each person put one item of food or a basic toiletry in a box to be collected at the January meeting. Robin Baker, Minister at the Oasis Christian Centre, collected the boxes. He started Acts of Kindness, which as part of its work, runs a Food Bank in Redditch. He went on to tell us what would happen to our donations and the way in which food and other basic necessities are distributed. He explained why there is such need and pointed out that you can't just walk in and pick up food. People are referred to the Food Bank by a variety of agencies and for many it is a difficult experience. Volunteers at the centre try to put them at their ease by talking to them and giving them a cup of tea. Practical advice is given as well as food for 3 days. Sometimes advice can be given regarding gas, electricity and benefits entitlement. Teaching people how to cook is another aspect of the help given. Robin's talk gave us much to think about. It is disturbing that so many people in Bromsgrove and Redditch are going hungry.

Looking to the future, we are having some interesting talks in the first half of the year. Peter Riley will be doing a presentation on "The National Trust – Housekeeping and Conservation" on February 13th, whilst John Butterworth will be telling us about "A Hotel with a famous Guest List" on March 13th. More talks follow on June 12th (Alan Thornton – "The Cadbury Story" and July 20th Adrian Jones – "Bodenham Arboretum") If anyone would like to join us at Bentley Village Hall, meetings start at 7.30 pm.

Hedgelaying, anyone?

Some of you may remember the Community Hall's *Tree O'Clock* project back in December 2009, when in collaboration with the Breathing Places team from the BBC and other partners including the Woodland Trust, we helped the UK set a new Guinness World Record for the most trees planted in one hour in multiple locations!

The benefit for Tardebigge Community Hall was a beautiful mixed hedge of traditional English plants including field maple, beech, hawthorn, dogwood and blackthorn along the length of its car park. You may have seen that in the intervening years, the hedge has thrived and is now well over 10 feet tall. The hall committee looked at it in Spring 2016 when a working party was held and also enlisted the opinion of our local Tree Officer, Andy Bucklitch. He suggested that we leave it another couple of years and then lay it.

This sounded wonderful, but we were not sure how easy or economical it would be ... enter Wade Muggleton, Countryside Officer at Worcestershire County Counci! He will be teaching between 10 and 12 volunteers to lay a hedge on **Saturday 3rd March 2018** and we will be practising on "our hedge" at the Community Hall, so if this is something you have always wanted to learn, this is your big opportunity!

We have several volunteers already, so if you are interested in being involved, please contact Lucy Parkes as soon as possible – you will be made most welcome. We suggest standard gardening clothes including sturdy gloves and footwear, plus something sharp for cutting – ideally a billhook, but axes, loppers, bow saws, pruning saws and secateurs will all work too.



Letter from the Archdeacon of Dudley The Venerable Nikki Groarke

Do you, like me, love to see people of all ages growing in faith and enjoying the love of God?

One of our four priorities within the Kingdom People vision is to increase our engagement with children, young people and their families across the diocese. Our newly formed team of Calling Young Disciples Mission Enablers are already having an impact in their host parishes and further afield. We now have six, working under the leadership of Project Director Ruth Walker, the final two having started in January.

I have been greatly encouraged to hear stories emerging as this creative team build relationships with congregations and both equip them, and help them to think differently!

Adam , for example, tells of how Messy Church is developing parish-wide as resources and talents are pooled and how it's being increasingly seen as an additional congregation rather than something to feed into the 9.30 am service.

Anne, Helen and Amy have enthused about the willingness to try something new from people who haven't been on the radar of clergy, people who have had a 'holy unrest'. The introduction of a Mission Enabler to poke and shake things up has helped to revive the fire in people. They have had 'God moments', when children, young people and adults have spoken about God and faith, and there has been a strong sense of God preparing the way in the places where they're allocated. They have seen evidence of where people have been working beneath the surface to progress the Kingdom People ethos and are now ready and willing to move with the tide.

Alongside the work of this team, as well as that of our Youth Officer, Simon and Children's Officer, Emma, we also had the privilege of a day's training from Lucy Moore on how to keep the discipleship focus of Messy Church in November. Nearly a hundred people were inspired and enthused to take their Messy Churches to the next level, and from some of the tweets I saw leading up to Christmas, this had excellent results.

I long to see churches across the diocese truly engaging with all ages effectively – our churches need to be multi-generational if they are to reflect the welcome of God's kingdom. I am looking forward to many more encouraging stories as we intentionally focus on this, and hope that all those families who packed out our special Christmas services will be invited back for other events soon. Please join me in praying for the work of the Calling Young Disciples Team, and our Diocesan Youth and Children's Officers, giving thanks for seeds sown, green shoots appearing, and the promise of more to come. I am sure we have an exciting year ahead!
