

# From Richard, the Team Rector



Every Church has a mission which was given to us by Christ: "Go into all the world and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all I have commanded you" (Matthew 28:19-20a)

Our Church Mission Statement, as established by the PCC, expresses our way of helping to fulfil this goal: *"Our Mission is to offer a wide variety of modern and traditional worship and to reach everyone with the good news of Jesus Christ.".* 

New ways of being church have been tried to reach people who are not unsympathetic to Christianity but are not comfortable engaging with the faith through traditional patterns of worship. These new forms of ministry are known as "Pioneer Ministry" or Fresh Expressions of Church". The Church of England has incorporated this approach into some of its thinking and practice.

The Tardebigge contribution to this movement is Café Church. Café Church is really a breakfast church as food is available before the main meeting at 9.30am. It is a means to reach people who find it difficult to bridge the gap between their usual way of life and attending a formal service in a church building. An increasing proportion of the population have not been brought up in church, and while the children who attend Tardebigge School are comfortable in a church building, their parents are usually less comfortable and, of course, most of our parishioners never attended Tardebigge School.

Our meeting, held in the Church Hall, has suddenly taken off in the second half of 2019, but is unable to grow any larger without having more than one meeting or changing where it meets. What a wonderful problem to have! And so, on Second and Fourth Sundays, we have Holy Communion at 8am followed by coffee in the Hall, followed by Café Church at 9.30am.



Our children's attendances per month has risen during 2019. Sunday mornings is not a good time slot to reach children over the age of six as there are too many competing activities so the rise in children's attendance in 2019 is especially commendable, but it is important to do all we can to share the faith with parents as they are the ones that make the decisions about what meetings and activities their children attend.

The type of service we attend is of less importance than our relationship with God. Whatever age we are, and whatever type of service we prefer, the Lord does not look upon the outward appearance; he looks upon the heart (1 Samuel 16:7). Lent begins on February 26<sup>th</sup>; there is no better time to renew our relationship with God and decide how best to increase the amount of time we set aside in our lives to worship him, and to use our time and talents in his service.

- The election of 2 members of the PCC to represent the parish on the Deanery Synod.

# **Celestial Corner**


I hope you all had a happy Christmas and that 2020 will be a a happy and healthy year for you all. To begin on a happy note, February 1<sup>st,</sup> the first day of spring in the solar cycle, what the ancient Britains called "Imbolc". Already there are signs that mother nature is awakening from her winter slumber with the appearance of snowdrops, "the Fair Maids of February", and other early blooms. The days are getting longer and so hopefully the weather will begin to improve and our spirits will be lifted from the "January blues"! However, the month is known as "February fill dyke" so we can not rule out some dreary wet days as well as any snow melt to fill the ditches!

As far as the night sky is concerned we still have Orion and his bright companions dominating the scene in the South. However, the most striking object is the brilliant Venus in the West, still visible at 8pm on the 14th and as both Venus and the Sun are climbing the ecliptic, at sunset Venus will be pretty high in the sky. Remember that Venus emerged from behind the Sun and is now catching us up on our respective travels along our orbits. Mercury is also an evening object and will be found low in the WSW soon after sunset at around 6pm. No other planets are visible in the evening so we will come back to Orion and Co.

You may remember that Orion is one of the "signposts" of the sky, a phrase coined by the late Sir Patrick Moore. This is because a) It is a bright, easily recognisable constellation and b) it can be used to point the way to others. The most obvious feature is his "belt", made up of three stars in a line. Below the belt we see his brightest star, blue/white "Rigel", a massive hot star which marks Orion's left ankle, (imagine his left leg bent as if climbing a step!). Above the belt lies Alpha Orionis, "Betelgeuse", slightly orange in colour. Betelgeuse is a red giant, a star that is nearing the end of it's life. Actually Rigel is brighter than Betelgeuse, but is only catalogued as Beta Orionis, so either the ancient Greek astronomers got it wrong, or Betelgeuse has faded over time. Those of you who have watched the Harry Potter films will recognise the next name, Bellatrix, (Bellatrix Le'Strange was one of the death eaters in the Harry potter series) "Bellatrix" is the name of the star opposite Betelgeuse and marks Orion's left shoulder.

The other star worth noting is "Saiph" to the left of Rigel marking Orion's right knee. Draw an imaginary line from Rigel through Betelgeuse and you will come to the two stars Pollux and Castor in Gemini (the twins). A line from right to left through the belt will point to Sirius, the brightest star in the sky, in Canis Major (the large dog). Sirius is another name Harry Potter fans will recognise as the name of the friend of Harry's parents, Sirius Black.Draw the line the other way (from left to right as we see it) and you come to Aldebaran, in Taurus ( the bull), another red giant. A line from Rigel through the left hand star of the belt brings us to Procyon in Canis Minor (the little dog).

Finally, a line from Saiph through Bellatrix and curving slightly left will find Capella in Auriga (the charioteer), almost overhead. Besides the bright nebular M42 and it's twin M43 there are three others but all are below naked eye visibility, two lie close to the left star of the belt one of which is known as the "Dark horses head" nebula as it contains a dust cloud shaped like a knight in chess, which cuts out all light behind it. Long exposure photos of the region show a great deal of nebulosity around the top and down the left side of Orion as we look at it. At the feet of Orion is the constellation of Lepus (the hare), a small constellation that contains a faint globular cluster, M79.





## **News from School**



The few weeks leading up to Christmas were really busy as the children rehearsed their Christmas plays: Our Reception children's nativity was the first production which was really well received. A few days later was the performance by Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2) and finally it was the turn of Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4) whose evening performance in church was atmospheric. All performances were excellent thanks to all the hard work by the staff and of course our talented pupils.

Friends of Tardebigge School (FOTS) organised a wonderful Christmas Fayre which was held in school on Saturday 7th December. The variety of stalls and al the hard work and support by all involved, raised £2248.18 which will benefit our pupils.

Our annual Christmas Jumper Day was held on Wednesday 18th December (the same day as the Christmas lunch) and we asked that any donations received would be in aid of the Cherish Fund, and used specifically for supporting children in Uganda. (In October Mary and Sheila came to talk to pupils in Years 3 and 4 about the work of a clinic in Namusaala, Uganda which they are very much involved with. The clinic does amazing work supporting disabled children. The Cherish Fund supports this clinic). Our Christmas Jumper Day raised an amazing £93.08. The charity will let us know how this money is spent.

This half term the Christian/ home school value we are focussing on is 'respect'. We are exploring how this value permeates throughout everything we do at school.

How much does a Grecian Urn?

There is nothing original about that remark. The crack has been made before; and cracks in the Tardebigge Church urns might have brought the house down if the urns had fallen through the roof.

Now they are safely on the ground without injury to anyone, and the children of the school recorded their descent in on the spot drawings, complete with men on the ground shouting up orders to strong nerved men (who never let a drop pass their lips while they are working) poised between heaven and earth. It was the Diocesan Architect who told us that three of the urns were in a dangerous condition, and something must be done about them before one of them landed on somebody's head.

Different opinions have been expressed by local people as to what to do now. But we have been advised that urns should be placed in position again as they were part of the original architect's design and are an intrinsic part of the building, so we have decided in the end that we should abide by that advice. We are not going to replace the same urns, but are having fibre glass ones made which, suitable stained, will look from the ground just like the old stone ones. This is going to cost about £600.

A gentleman who was speaking to me recently about the replacement of the urns said if by the end of March I could get eleven other people to contribute £50 each he would give me £50 towards the work. Another gentleman who was in the room and heard this offer, immediately said he would do the same.

Are there other friends of Tardebigge Church, who love the building and what goes in it and from it, who would do the same; or give  $\pounds 25$ , or  $\pounds 10$ , or something which they feel they could afford?

I have not made a direct appeal before for anything to do with repairs to the Church, but with the kind offers of these two friends before me, must do so in this case.

Here and now I acknowledge also the kindness of the family of the late Philip Hill, killed some weeks ago in a motor cycle accident, who, although nothing had been said to them about it by me, asked their friends at the funeral to contribute something towards the repairs. What was given came to £34. I do thank them again that in their own great sadness they should have thought of helping us in this way.

# A Letter from the Archdeacon of Dudley

Lent will soon be upon us, with its opportunities for taking up spiritual disciplines for a season, doing those things which we know deep down are good for our spiritual health, but often struggle to commit to. Our culture is increasingly short-term, getting people to sign up for anything which stretches indefinitely into the future is challenging, but most of us can manage something for six weeks. And the good news is, research shows it takes about six weeks to form a habit!

So which Lenten discipline might we consider in 2020? What is going to be of most benefit for our growth as disciples of Jesus, as kingdom people? For some of us it may be good to take up something new, like joining a Lent study group in our church, or committing to daily bible readings in one of the many excellent resources available. Others will want to fast from something for the entire season, or a day a week. This may be physical fasting from food, or alcohol or chocolate, or perhaps a lifestyle fast, cutting out social media or TV. The key thing is that all these disciplines serve to help us focus more on God, making some space in our lives to pray and listen to him.Perhaps we may simply want to do something we are already doing, but more intentionally and regularly, with more focus, giving a little more time and effort to it.

Discipline is hard work! If our souls, bodies or minds are not stretched by our Lenten endeavours, we are probably not being disciplined enough. I am learning a great deal about physical discipline as I undertake training for running my first marathon at the end of April. The fact that so many lovely supporters are sponsoring me to raise funds for the Children's Society means I have further incentive to keep going, but on a cold and wet day, getting my running shoes on is all about discipline, mind over matter, doing what I have committed to, however it feels. Sometimes it is inconvenient, sometimes it hurts, but I know that I have to keep going, or I will never complete the race before me.

Often when I run, God reveals to me how spiritual disciplines can be similar to physical ones. Routine, habit, consistency are all the staples for health and fitness whether that is in our physical or spiritual life. I will be praying on my ever-longer runs, and using that space away from the phone and email to build my relationship with God, asking him to show me where I need better patterns in my spiritual disciplines to grow closer to him. My hope is that my new running regime won't stop at the London Marathon finish line, and that (after a suitable rest!), I will maintain my new level of fitness. I hope and pray too that all of us who take up new spiritual disciplines for Lent will build healthy habits which stay with us and help us mature as followers of Jesus will beyond Holy Week. Just like my running, they will require effort, and also appropriate rest!

The year was rounded off on 16 December with a social evening at a local pub. "A good time was had by all". Photo by Ellie Keans.




